

Overview

With even more records broken, new staff and countless people helped it's been a busy few months on site.

We provided a record 5904 emergency parcels in the first eight months of 2023 compared to 3877 in 2022; 774 in August alone. Some days we've provided as many as 50 emergency parcels. Referrals are currently up 53% on last year.

Over the past few weeks we've provided an average of 38 parcels per day. This is the equivalent of supporting 74 people per day through parcels. A figure eclipsed by the number of people helped through other things (breakfast clubs etc). Bringing the total number of people helped per day to between 150-200.

This increase in demand has understandably put a strain on our stocks. Back in April we had one of our lowest levels of stock for many years. Following an increase in our bulk purchasing (from wholesalers) and a successful plea to locals and businesses we're now back to a healthier level of stock. We continue to spend around £5,000 on fresh stock and £8,000 on long life stock each month.

As such, we're pleased to be working with The Hygiene Bank to distribute hygiene products (toothpaste, shower gel etc) to our clients. Much of which has been donated by major retailers.
